My DNA Match with Shannon Wiley (and where it took me)

I recently wrote an extensive narrative about my DNA matches with descendants of Miles Oakley (1612-1672) and Mary Browne (1607-1682). This couple were my eighth-great grandparents. See:

Much of the work I described in this narrative was based on my DNA match with Rev. Timothy W. Bever. Tim and I have a 45.8 cM DNA match on Chromosome 15, as shown in this screenshot from the GEDmatch.com website:

Based solely on the size of this DNA match, software on Ancestry.com predicts that Tim and I would be third-cousins once-removed. Based on our ancestral lines going back to our Most Recent Common Ancestors – Miles Oakley (1671-1743) and his wife Mercy Gardner (1673-1723) – Tim and I actually are seventh-cousins [see our relationship chart in the Appendix]. In earlier narratives, I have written that this particular DNA segment is a "sticky segment", and it appears that it is passed from parent to child with little diminution.

In the narrative referenced at the top of this page, I speculated that if Tim and I had a "Shared DNA Match" with anyone on Ancestry.com, then this person would be an *Oakley-Browne* descendant. So I began systematically looking at our Shared DNA Matches. One of these matches was Shannon Wiley:



Shannon and I share 32 cM of DNA, while Shannon and Tim share 1,599 cM of DNA. Software on Ancestry.com suggested that Shannon was Tim's half-sister or niece. I sent Tim an email note and he replied that Shannon was his half-sister.

I looked at my DNA match with Shannon on the Ancestry.com website, and I learned that she has large DNA matches with Tim's brother John Bever, as well as Tim's uncle Rev. Howard Bever:




I also learned that Shannon has a DNA match with Cassidy Prentiss:



Cassidy is a granddaughter of Rev. Howard Oakley Bever.

My knowledge of the *Bever* family allowed me to construct the following relationship chart:



Note that I have DNA matches with Rev. Howard Oakley Bever and his granddaughter Cassidy Prentiss, with the late Rev. George Verden Bever (1929-2012), and Rev. George Bever's children, Shannon Wiley, Rev. Timothy W. Bever, and John Bever.

Of course, I have these DNA matches with these six individuals because they all are descended from Gladys Harriet Oakley (1910-2014). Gladys was married to Rev. Howard Cecil Bever (1903-1981), and this couple appears in the box at the top of the relationship chart. Gladys was in the same generation as my paternal grandfather, Ray Miller Oakley (1876-1948).

I was amazed to see that Gladys lived to be 104 years old! Here is her obituary from the *Sacramento Bee*:

ladys Harriet Bever was called home to God on Thurs., Nov. 6, 2014. Memorial service was Sat., Nov. 22 at Riverside Christian Church in Wichita, KS. Burial will be in Wheatland, CA at a later date. She was born July 30, 1910 at Wheatland, CA to Amasa George Oakley and Harriette Amy Leet Beilby, the 6th of 7 children. In 1928 she married Rev. H. Cecil Bever. A pastor's wife, she served God as youth counselor, church secretary, choir director and women's group leader and officer. She was preceded in death by her parents, husband, all of her siblings and son George. She is survived by daughter Gail Gunning, Norman, OK and son Howard Bever, Wichita, KS and many grand, great-grand and great-greatgrandchildren. 

She is buried in the Wheatland Cemetery in Wheatland, Yuba County, California. Interestingly, that is the town where she was born. Wheatland is located less than 40 miles straight north of Sacramento.

There are several generations of Gladys' *Oakley* ancestors buried in Wheatland Cemetery. Gladys' father was Amasa George Oakley (1874-1932), and his entry on FindAGrave.com is at:

The entries for Amasa George Oakley and his father Amasa Wilder Oakley on FindAGrave.com list the graves of a number of their immediate family members (parents, siblings, children), most of whom are buried in Wheatland Cemetery.

In looking at Amasa Wilder Oakley, I see that he was born in Fort Ticonderoga, New York. What brought him to Yuba County, California? Was he a prospector searching for gold? Did he move to California during the gold rush after 1849?

In the 1860 US Census, he is listed as living in Yuba County and his occupation was "Farmer":



Did he go to California to search for gold (or silver), and then stay there as a farmer? I wonder if Tim has any information about this.

Concluding Remarks


I began this brief narrative by looking at my DNA match with Shannon Wiley. I learned that she is Tim Bever's half-sister. I now have found that I have DNA matches with Tim, Tim's brother John, Tim's half-sister Shannon Wiley, Tim's uncle Howard Bever, and Howard's granddaughter Cassidy Prentiss.

I have DNA matches with these people because they all are descended from Gladys Harriet Oakley (1910-2014), who was married to Howard Cecil Bever. I took a major detour in this narrative, and added a lot of material about Gladys, her father, Amasa George Oakley, and her grandfather, Amasa Wilder Oakley.

Amasa Wilder Oakley was born in New York, but moved to Yuba County, California sometime before his early 30's. I wonder what attracted him to move so far west? And the family obviously put down roots in Yuba County, since Gladys was buried there in 2014, more than 150 years after her grandfather settled there.
