## Anna Guttorp – One of my Closest Brorström Relatives in Sweden

#### Introduction

My mother was Grace Florence Brorström (1916-2000). All four of her grandparents were Swedes who immigrated to America in the 1880's. This means that ethnically she was 100% Swedish, which makes me 50% Swedish.

I became quite interested in my Swedish genealogy in 2013, after a distant Swedish cousin named Göran Grottling contacted my daughter Amy Oakley about a DNA match they share on the 23andme.com website.

Over time, I have learned more about my Swedish ancestry, and I have also been fortunate to connect with a number of my distant Swedish cousins, and even visit with them when I have travelled to Sweden. This narrative is about one of these Swedish cousins – a woman named Anna Guttorp.

## Anna Guttorp


The Internet is an amazing resource for bringing people together. In October 2013, I did a Google search for my mother's paternal grandfather (her *farfar* in Swedish – literally, her father's father), **Paulus** Bernhard Jacob Brorström (1859-1932). Paulus immigrated to America with his wife Bernhardine Wennström in 1882.

Here is a screenshot showing the result of this Google search:



The first "hit" from this Google search was for Paulus Brorström and his wife Bernhardine Wennström, and Google found this information on a website called guttorps.se. [The .se country-code domain name is an extension that represents websites located in Sweden.]

When I followed the link, I was amazed to see my great-grandparents!



Also listed on this page was my mother's father (*morfar* in Swedish), Paul **Thure** Brorström, along with his older brother and five younger sisters. Following the link to my *morfar* led me to the following page:



OMG – My mother, Grace Florence Brorström, is listed on this page. How cool to see my family tree on a genealogy website in Sweden!

I went to the homepage for the guttorps.se website, where I saw:

# Släkten Guttorp med närstående Anna Guttorp

A translation of this would be "The Family Guttorp with Close Relatives". And it looks like this site is owned/managed by someone named Anna Guttorp. Who is this Anna Guttorp? Why does she have my Brorström-Wennström-Larsson family line on her genealogy website?

The answer, of course, was found on the guttorps.se website. I first looked up Anna in the index, then followed her ancestors back to ....

drum roll, please ......


Anna's *farfar* (paternal grandfather) was Anders **Malte** Viktor Guttorp (1890-1959), and his mother was a Brorström – her name was **Pella** Hanna Petronella Gustava Brorström (1853-1922).

And Pella's father was **Malte** Joachim August Brorström (1816-1877) – and  $\underline{he}$  was my  $2^{nd}$ -great grandfather. That means that Anna Guttorp is my Brorström cousin!

It turns out that Anna and I are third-cousins, as shown in the following chart:



Amazing that a Google search for my mother's *farfar* turned up a third-cousin in Sweden!

I should note that **Malte** Joachim August Brorström (1816-1877) was married twice. His first wife was Boel Bengtsdotter (1818-1853), and after she died in 1853, he married Mathilda Augusta Billing (1826-1862). Anna is descended from Malte and his first wife, while I am descended from Malte and his second wife.

From the homepage of the guttorps.se website, I learned that Anna lives in Norrtälje, which is a small town (population 17,000) located near the Baltic Sea some 70 km northeast of Stockholm. And this homepage also included Anna's email address. On 17 October 2013, I sent her an e-mail note with information about how we are related. She immediately responded, and said she had a number of family photos I might like to see.

Well, in a few more days, we were Facebook friends:



Anna even added my family to the guttorps.se website! And, as she mentioned, she sent me some family photos:

Pella and Paulus never saw each other after he left Sweden in 1882, but they wrote a lot of letters to each other. The two oldest children (both daughters) were from Malte's first marriage, while the three youngest children (all sons) were from Malte's second marriage. [A third daughter from Malte's first marriage, died at age 5.]

When I visited Sweden in the summer of 2016 with my Swedish-American cousin Susan Brorström Baker, we met Anna and a number of other Brorström descendants in Lund. We toured the area of Lund where Malte Guttorp (Anna's *farfar*) lived.

When I visited Sweden in May 2017, I took a bus to Norrtälje and spent a day with Anna and her husband Jakob Jakobsson. What great people!

## Anna's Family

As I just mentioned, Anna is married to Lars **Jakob** Jakobsson – here is a photo of the two of them in the living room of their home in Norrtälje:



Anna and Jakob have two children, a son Erik **Arvid** Jokobsson (born 1974) and a daughter **Valborg** Karin Jakobsson Guttorp (born 1978).

Arvid and his wife have a son Holger (born 2012), and Valborg and her partner have a son Johan (born 1999). When I visited Anna and Jakob in Norrtälje, I met Valborg, who works as a librarian at a local public school.

Anna has published a number of books, ranging from novels to historic fiction to photoessays. Here are some relevant images:




Peter Långström var kapten och gerillakämpe i Karl XII:s armé.



## The Family Name Guttorp

The astute reader will by now be puzzled – where did the family name Guttorp come from? Note that Pella Brorström's husband was Frans August Åkesson, but his son's surname was Guttorp:



The home page of the guttorps.se website has:



The picture shows Malte and Valborg Åkesson with their three oldest children: Ruth, Nils and Gunnel. The picture was taken in the mid-1920's. Ten years later, the family changed their name to Guttorp after the place they came from - Gudmundtorp. (There was a teacher in the village where they lived then called Åkesson.)

[As an aside, note that the letter Å in Swedish is pronounced like the letter O in English, so Åkesson is pronounced somewhat like Oak-e-son.]

Anna told me that there was another family named Åkesson living in Gudmundtorp in the mid-1930's, and Malte Åkesson was upset that their postal mail was often sent to the other Åkesson family. So he changed the family name! And since they lived in Gudmondtorp, he picked the name of Guttorp. Just like that!

## **Summary**

This brief narrative has been about my third-cousin Anna Guttorp, who lives with her husband Jakob Jakobsson in Norrtälje, Sweden. Anna and I are both descended from our 2<sup>nd</sup>-great grandfather, Malte Joachim August Brorström (1816-1877).

Anna is quite a genealogist, and I first connected with her because of her genealogy website <u>guttorps.se</u>.

But beyond being a genealogist, Anna is an incredibly interesting person – after all, she is a Brorström descendant. It has been a lot of fun to see all of the family photos and letters that she has. What a great resource for our Brorström family genealogy!


