Who Was Elsie Benson and How Am I Related to Her?

Introduction

In my condo in Naples, Florida, I have a beautiful woven mat on my dining room table:



My Swedish-American first-cousin Susan Baker (nee Brorström) gave me this mat about five years ago and told me that it was woven many decades ago by our Swedish cousin Elsie Benson.

Elsie Benson? Who is she and how am I related to her?

I know that Elsie Benson had a son named Roy Benson. I know that she lived in Corte Madera, California, which is located north of San Francisco in Marin County. I remember that when my mother visited my wife and me when we were living in San Francisco in the late 1970's, we all drove to Corte Madera and had lunch with Elsie at her house. My wife recalls that it was the first time that she had eaten avocado.

I had a dim recollection that Elsie was related to me through my maternal grandmother, Edna Florence Larsson (married name Brorström).

My Swedish-American first-cousin Janet Nathe Potts grew up in our grandmother's house in Pleasantville, New York. I sent her an e-mail asking about Elsie Benson, and she replied:

I think she was a friend of Grandma Brorström's from Sweden. She stayed with us in Pleasantville for a few days when I was 6 or 7 – in 1956 or so. She taught me to knit – I still have the scarf I made then! I remember her with a strong Swedish accent.

This narrative is about how I figured out how Elsie and I were related.

Looking Online for Information about Elsie Benson

I first became interested in my Swedish genealogy in 2013, when I learned that I have a DNA match with a Swede named Göran Grottling.¹ Göran is an expert genealogist, and in order to figure out how we are related, he spent a great deal of time researching the ancestral lines of my mother's four grandparents who immigrated from Sweden to American in the 1880's.

Göran eventually learned that he and I are related through my mother's maternal grandfather, Lars Emil Larsson (1864-1945). The connection through Lars Emil Larsson was quite difficult to identify, since he was born with the name Lars Emil Börjesson – his father was Börje Larsson and using the patronymic naming convention in place in Sweden at that time, his last name became Börjesson (literally Börje's son). He apparently changed his name to Larsson when he immigrated to America, and he also changed his birth year by one year. So he wasn't easily found in the church records in Sweden. As an aside, it appears that he left Sweden without permission from the church.

At any rate, Göran sent me a great deal of information about Lars Emil Larsson's family. The following screenshot shows his parents and four of his sisters:


Thekla Elise **Börjesdotter** (375). Född 1873-04-02 i Fjärås (N). Emigrated together with her two children 1897-04-12.

Helga Bernhardina Börjesdotter (376). Född 1876-04-18 i Fjärås (N). Emigrated alone 1895-03-08.

Gift 1859-04-08 i Fjärås (N) med föregående ana.
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
According to Göran's research, Lars Emil and his four sisters all immigrated to America. I should note that Lars Emil's family lived in Fjärås, which is a small town in Kungsbacka Municipality, Halland County, Sweden. Fjärås is about 45 km south of Göteborg, as shown in the following Google Map:




I first visited Fjärås in the summer of 2016, when I was visiting Göteborg with my Swedish-American cousin Susan Baker (nee Brorström). Göran drove us there and arranged a tour of the area, including the old church and several places where Lars Emil lived. I subsequently visited Fjärås with my cousin Jenny in the spring of 2019. [See photos in the Appendix].

But I digress... Getting back to Elsie Benson – At this point, I knew that Lars Emil Larsson had four sisters who immigrated to America. I wondered if Elsie Benson was a direct descendant of one of them. I started with a basic search on Ancestry.com – I searched for Elsie Benson, and I assumed that she had died in Corte Madera, Marin County, California. Of course, I didn't have a lot of hope for this search, since I figured that Elsie was just a nickname. I also added her son, Roy Benson, to the search:



Here are the results of this search:




OMG! Elsie Benson appears in six family trees on the Ancestry.com website!! The first tree is shown here – the "bradley holway" family tree, which contains an amazing 167,614 people.

I viewed Elsie's profile in the "bradley holway" tree:



This profile shows that Elsie Benson's full name was Hildur Elsa Alexandra Andersson. She was born in Göteborg in 1905, and died in Marin County, California, in 1996. It shows her husband, Arvid Roy Benson (1901-1980) and their son, Roy Arvid Benson (1929-2009). This profile also shows that she immigrated to America in the summer of 1925, just as she turned twenty years old:




Now that I found Elsie Benson on Ancestry.com, it was just a matter of looking at her various ancestral lines until I could connect her back to Lars Emil Larsson. Or it was quite possible that I would find a different way in which we were related – or even no relationship at all. Stay tuned!

Elsie Benson's father was Henry Alexius Andersson (1881-1951). Here is his profile from the "bradley holway" family tree:



I note that he was born in Fjärås, which is where Lars Emil Larsson lived, so this is encouraging. Unfortunately, the "bradley holway" family tree doesn't go back to Henry's parents. So I had to look for his parents in other trees on Ancestry.com.

I found another profile for Henry Alexius Andersson in the "Stenborg" family tree, which is owned by Kent Stenborg:



OMG! Henry's mother was Hilda Evelina Börjesdotter (1862-1944), and she was one of Lars Emil Larsson's sisters!! Bingo!


Here is Hilda's profile from the "Stenborg" family tree:



This shows that Hilda's parents were Börje Larsson (1835-1878) and his wife Anna Helena Andersdotter (1837-). This couple were my second-great grandparents.

Hilda was born in Fjärås. This profile has her death in "Sverige" (Sweden), but Göran Grottling found that she immigrated to America. The "Stenborg" family tree has her husband dying in Fjärås in 1911, so maybe she immigrated to America after that.

At any rate, I now have learned how Elsie Benson and I were related. Here is a chart showing this relationship:



Based on this chart, Elsie and my mother were second-cousins, so Elsie and I were second-cousins once-removed. And Roy Benson and I were third-cousins.

And Elsie's father and my maternal grandmother were first-cousins.

Other Connections to Lars Emil Larsson and his Ancestors

I previously have written about my DNA connections with individuals who have ancestral lines going back to the ancestors of Lars Emil Larsson in Fjärås, Sweden.

One DNA match is with Robert Bergmark, who is descended from Lars Emil's sister Anna Louisa (Lovisa) Larsson:

Overall, I have twenty-five DNA matches with descendants of the parents of Börje Larsson.




Knowing how Elsie and I were related makes my woven mat even more special.


